### Part I

## 1. The Principal's Report

Govt. M.H. college of Home Science & Science for Women, Jabalpur, being a renowned college for girls with hostel facility and located at the heart of the city holds preference among the girl students. As a result the admission rate is high and the reservation policy provided by the state government of M.P. is followed.

The college curriculum is designed keeping in mind the vision and mission of the institution. It provides flexibility at UG and PG levels offering thirteen undergraduate, ten postgraduate, two PG diploma and five certificate (IGNOU) courses, which is supported by experienced teaching faculty, conducive environment of the institution and strong physical and academic infrastructure. It also integrates issues relating to gender, environment, human values and professional ethics. All the courses bear emphasis on employability. Various transferrable skills are imparted through value added courses. Practical work is an essential part of the curriculum at UG and PG level in all courses. Add-on courses on computer basics are compulsory for all first-year students.

The goals and objectives of the institution are translated into action by thoughtful planning and its proper execution. Various academic options at UG and PG level along with knowledge of computers and other skills, imparted by the institution, encourage students to excel in academic activities. Equal importance is given to extension activities. Departmental activity clubs, NSS and NCC units carry out several community projects. Sports, gym workout, Yoga and Marshall Arts also form a part of the curriculum.

A broad frame work of the academic calendar is planned at the beginning of each session. On the basis of this, teaching plans are made by teachers for their respective courses and targets are achieved as per the schedule. Teaching is made interesting and more explanatory by the use of audio-visual systems, LCD projector, OHP models and online links. Other means of teaching include lectures by experts, educational excursions, industrial and field visits. Slow and advanced learners are identified in the beginning of the academic session. Advance learners are given the responsibility to guide and help their fellow slow learners in their studies. Remedial classes are arranged for slow learners and students hailing from the disadvantaged communities. The progress of students is very closely monitored by continuous comprehensive evaluations, tests & teacher guardian interaction.

Thirteen different modes are used to judge the progress and performance of students. The college follows a continuous and transparent evaluation process that enables students to perform optimally. Under transparency of examination, students are allowed to see their answer books after applying for observation. Timely conduction of examination and declaration of results is assured in the interest of students.

Teacher Guardian Scheme is introduced for providing personal attention to students. The teacher in charge takes care of these students and makes every effort to solve their problems, if any and guide them for their career.

Faculty members ensure their academic growth by participating and organizing seminars, workshops and conferences. Many faculty members are supervisors to candidates pursuing PhD degree. The faculty is well versed with the ICT related techniques. Every faculty member is holding the membership of e-library INFLIBNET. To ensure excellence in academic and administrative activities, the college conducts appraisals annually.

As research is an integral part of academics. Research work is accomplished at an accountable level and the institution provides all required facilities like laboratory, chemicals, instruments, good library and a congenial atmosphere for the same. The research work carried out by the faculty members is published in National and International journals.

The College is recognized as Research Centre by the RDVV, Jabalpur for Ph.D. courses in the following subjects: 1. Botany, 2. Chemistry, 3. Zoology, 4. Food & Nutrition, 5. Clothing & Textile, 6. Human Development, 7. Resource Management.

14 faculty members are registered in R.D. University as research guides. For accomplishment and completion of research work, linkages with different colleges and University Teaching Departments have been established.

The college has taken several initiatives to increase creativity and transfer of knowledge. The college publishes its annual research journal "Anusandhan" whose registration no. is ISSN-0975-3443 and college magazine "Abhivyakti". The research culture among MSc. Students is promoted through dissertation work.

The college building is a beautiful piece of architectural work. The college infrastructure consists of three storied main block, four hostel buildings, auditorium, sports complex, principal's bungalow,

warden bungalows, crèche, juice corner, PCO, canteen, gymnasium, Montessori school, playground and gardens spread over 10.75 acre of land in the heart of the city. All class rooms are well lit, ventilated, and fitted with close circuit cameras for close monitoring of the entire premises. Thirteen classrooms including 13 smart class rooms are fitted with LCD projectors& all laboratories are well equipped. Library and reading room are situated at ground floor. Library is regularly enriched with new books and Journals. The college has procured network version of SOUL software for automation of the Library.

For the development of creativity and event management skills several short-term courses are organized by every department. Publication of college magazine, departmental magazines, wall magazines, participation in extra and co-curricular activities, departmental club activities and extension activities are integral part of curriculum. All these activities ensure holistic development of students. Quality education and strong base at Undergraduate level encourage students towards Master's Degree. Appropriate activities are organized to increase consciousness about national identities and symbols and birth anniversaries of great personalities are also celebrated.

Toppers of UG and PG classes are awarded with Gold Medals. One student with excellence in general proficiencies is also awarded with Gold medal. Students excelling in academics and extracurricular activities are acknowledged and awarded in special functions.

The institution has a registered alumni association with members well placed in India as well as abroad. The alumni contribute significantly to the development of the institution through financial and other means.

Well defined perspective plans for academic, administrative and physical infrastructure are designed and implemented meticulously. The effective and efficient governance of the college is assured by working with customized integrated web enabled application software. Through IQAC the college has taken several initiatives to promote innovations and best practices. In this regard the college ensures quality education, healthy and secure environment, warm student teacher relationship and excellent hostel facility to all students, irrespective of their socioeconomic background. Social justice is ensured by providing financial assistance to students belonging to disadvantaged class and economically weaker section of the society. Fair and visionary administration, dedication of faculty and office staff assures academic excellence and effective resource development. Quality is maintained through repetitive monitoring by college authorities and reviews by external committees like Higher Education MP, Rani Durgavati University Jabalpur.

Apart from this, CCTV cameras, security guards, Mahila Police Chowki are some safety measures initiated by the institution. The management also makes use of alternate energy resources to sustain environment and has also developed means for waste management and constructed 'rain water harvesting and vermin compost pits. Beautiful gardens with medicinal plants, regular plantation are

some green initiatives taken by the institution. It has a polythene free campus and concrete roads.

Personality development cell, guidance and placement cell guide and prepare students for various competitive examination and interviews. A good number of students proceed for higher education while others prefer job. For the support of students, the college has created several facilitating mechanisms like grievance redressal cell discipline and anti-ragging committee, sexual harassment committee etc. The students are free to put their grievances if any, directly to the principal, online, committee members or in the sealed box placed in the office. The grievances are taken care of and redressed by the respective committee.

## III. History of the college with significant milestones

### Journey at a Glance

On July 15, 1954 Govt. M. H. College of Home Science and Science for Women came into existence to promote higher education among women. The idea of establishing an educational institute to educate women of central India was conceived by Hon'ble Shri Parmanand Bhai Patel, a renowned industrialist and a great philosopher of Jabalpur. Shri Parmanand Bhai Patel's firm m/s Mohanlal Hargovind Das donated Rs. One Lakh for the establishment of the college. On April 27, 1956 the foundation stone was laid down on 11 acres of government land, situated in the heart of Jabalpur city, by the then chief minister of MP.

The college is affiliated to Rani Durgavati Vishwavidyalaya, Jabalpur which awards degrees to the students. Govt. M.H. College is one of the pioneering institutions of Madhya Pradesh that has been conferred with the autonomous system in higher education in 1989. NAAC accredited the college with B++ grade in 2003 and subsequently with 'A' grade with CGPA 3.41 in the 2<sup>nd</sup> cycle in 2012 and B+ grade with CGPA 2.64 in 2019 in the third cycle. The college was selected in the UGC scheme "College with Potential for Excellence" in 2004.

The college caters to the educational needs of young women coming from different strata of society by providing equal opportunities in conventional courses & various vocational courses in Science & Home Science faculty. To keep pace with the changing scenario the courses are restructured to include basic as well as emerging interdisciplinary and application — oriented areas. The courses offered are adequately strengthened to develop appropriate skills, which are significant not only to the students, but also to the local, regional and national needs. Sufficient freedom is allowed to the students to choose the courses best suited to their interests and capabilities. The college also emphasizes on value-based education to inculcate soft skills.

Admission is centralized through online portal of Department of Higher Education. As per the rules of MP Higher Education, seats are reserved for SC, ST and OBC, the percentage is SC 16%, ST 20%, and OBC 14%. Special weightage in terms of marks is given to Athletes, Sport Persons and for Extra Curricular Activities.
